Sylvester McCoy Interview 15th October 2010

The resident illustrator and interviewer of the Doctor Who Club of Victoria, Manuel Bouw, sets forth to interview not only the Seventh Doctor, but also both his companions. The interviews with Sophie Aldred and Bonnie Langford were conducted online earlier this year. Sylvester McCoy's interview was taken in person the afternoon preceding Armageddon 2010.

This interview is for the Doctor Who Club of Victoria magazine, Sonic Screwdriver, which comes out every two months, so this interview won't be published until Christmas.

[McCoy] The way I feel I might not be around at Christmas.

[Bouw] The last time you were in Melbourne was for King Lear, [McCoy] It was okay really — it which I remember as I was getting married at the time and missed out on seeing it.

[McCoy] Well, you should've cancelled the wedding. How dare you miss out?

Are you enjoying your time here in Melbourne, despite the weather?

[McCoy] Yeah I like Melbourne, I've been here a couple of times. I was here doing King Lear and then before that I was here rehearsing a show which eventually toured around Australia.

Sophie Aldred Interview

When you joined the cast of Doctor Who in 1987, what impact did you have on the design and character of Ace?

I was one of the lucky ones! Having come from a background of fringe and children's theatre, I naturally assumed that I would have a lot of say in my costume. Also, the new young Script Editor, Andrew Cartmel, came up to me at the read through and said he really liked the way I was dressed (stripey t-shirt, army shorts, Doc Marten boots) and did I think that was a good sort of look for Ace? It always felt like a collaborative process, including character. Before I did my first season proper, Andrew got me together with the writers for tea so that we could discuss character and they could meet me and suss me out. I thought this was great as it made for a lot more realism, I felt.

<u>Looking back, how do you feel about Ace's</u> <u>personal journey throughout her time in the show?</u>

Many have argued that Ace had the greatest character arc during the show's run, one that had never been seen before or since. Well, I would say that certainly before, there was not such a rounded, complex character; and that was partly due to the generosity of Sylvester as an actor (although he was only too happy to give me the techno jargon lines) and the foresight of Andrew Cartmel. I didn't really think of it - I hadn't watched Doctor Who for a long time - but with hindsight it really was rather remarkable, considering there were no other drama roles for young actresses at the time. I would like to think that Rose couldn't have happened without Ace, but then Russell T is an extraordinarily clever man with his finger on the zeitgeist — but to me there were similar elements, especially with 'Survival Ace'.

In 2008, the readers of SFX Magazine rated Ace as the 4th-Best Doctor Who Companion of all time. How does it feel to still be so highly regarded by the viewers?

I am always delighted that fans have been so taken by the character of Ace, and that she continues to be a force in her own right!

When the show ended in 1989, the character of Ace lived on in various novel and comic books, and there are varied fates which could be attributed to the character, depending on which medium you followed. What future would you have liked to see for Ace?

I must say I did like the idea that she was going to be taken to Gallifrey to train as a Time Lord and put the wind up them! I can't see her having been married off, can you?

With the resurgence in popularity of Doctor Who over the last five years, have you ever thought about a return to the show, either as Ace or perhaps even as a new character? If asked, would you like to?

I love the new series with a passion. I am so delighted to see friends who were originally fans of the show now working on the series and doing such a great job. My 10 year old son has just been allowed to watch his first series live, and his first episode was the first Matt Smith. I had tears in my eyes as I watched his open mouthed wonder and wide eyed excitement. What a great introduction... I would be honoured to go back, as all of us companions would.

The Feast of Steven is essentially two storylines: the first being set in a Liverpool police station, where the Doctor is arrested for loitering. The second has the TARDIS crew on the run from an angry film crew after they accidentally land in the middle of a 1920s film set!

The episode concluded with the infamous scene where the Doctor turns to the camera and wishes the viewers a happy Christmas.

The episode went to air on Christmas Day 1965, at the special time of 6.36pm, and ran for 24'36". It aired only once.

Due to the comical nature of the episode, it was deemed unnecessary for it to be telerecorded onto 16mm film, as it wouldn't be sold overseas. (When The Dalek Masterplan was offered for overseas sale, it was packaged as an 11-episode story).

As such, the episode only existed as a 2" 405-line Quad tape, before being wiped by the Engineering Department on August 17th, 1967, along with several ot<mark>he</mark>r episodes of the story. As no other copy was made, this episode is now considered gone for good

The 20 images that you see alongside are all that remains. These were taken by actor Robert Jewell, whose main association with Doctor Who was as a Dalek operator. In this episode though, Jewell was able to get out of the Dalek casing and play the role of Bing Crosby.

How William Hartnell Broke the Fourth Wall By Luke Filmer

new 'tradition'; only one episode of Doctor Who has premiered on Christmas Day. Way back in 1965, William Hartnell's Doctor took a break from the machinations of The Daleks Masterplan with a lighter episode, The Feast of Steven.

The Feast of Steven was written to provide an interlude from the epic 12-week storyline over the holiday period and comprises 2 unrelated segments. The TARDIS initially lands outside a Liverpool police station in a spoof of 60s police drama Z Cars and the Doctor must be rescued by Steven & Sara Kingdom when he is arrested for loitering. The travellers then arrive on a 1920's Hollywood film set where their appearance causes havoc with the studio crew. The episode takes a very light tone (only one mention of the Daleks and the Time Destructor) and includes what is probably the series' first 'in joke', with the Doctor recognising a character from "the marketplace in Jaffa" (Reg Pritchard played Ben Daheer in The Crusade and has a brief role in this episode).

The Feast of Steven survives only as an audio recording made by a fan at the time - not only was it among the first episodes of Doctor Who to be wiped; it wasn't transferred to film and was removed from the story when *Masterplan* was offered for overseas sale; meaning it is the least likely recovery from the 108 currently missing episodes. (Masterplan and the prelude episode, Mission to the Unknown are the only episodes

Before RTD made a Christmas Special the never screened outside the UK, making the 3 episodes that have been found extremely fortunate discoveries!) For years, it was rumoured that the Hartnell family had a copy of The Feast of Steven that they used to watch at family gatherings, but this was found to be incorrect (actually a clip from The Dalek Invasion of Earth).

> The fan audio recording was used in the CD release of Masterplan (with linking narration from Peter Purves); the only other known record of The Feast of Steven is a small collection of telesnaps taken by Dalek operator Robert Jewell who played Bing Crosby in the 1920s segment of the episode.

> The Feast of Steven is probably best known for its final moments when William Hartnell celebrates Christmas by acknowledging it with us, the viewers; turning to the camera and wishing us '...a very happy Christmas to all of you at home'. It's done in the right spirit and in the appropriate episode but it sure must've been a shock seeing it the first time. I believe it's been a point of conjecture as to whether Hartnell was ad-libbing or whether the writer or director had something to do

> As part of the Masterplan epic, The Feast of Steven is a nice breather at the halfway point allowing the regulars some fun in a different environment but it contrasts heavily with the episodes surrounding it, especially the sombre ending to episode 12...



Cybermen DVD Box Set

In the tradition of packaging episodes from disparate eras in a box set linked by the featured villains comes the Cybermen Box Set — containing Revenge of the Cybermen and Silver Nemesis, possibly two of the weakest 'Cyber-stories'. Made 13 years apart, these two stories demonstrate the degeneration of once-great Doctor Who villains.

Quick synopses...

homeless cyberdudes are out to destroy what's left ordinary Time Lord. of the legendary planet of gold, so no one can use the gold to clog up their chest units. Meanwhile the people of Voga hire a double agent, argue a lot and build a rocket to try an destroy the Cybermen. Doctor #4, Sarah Jane and Harry get caught up in the middle of it all.

with a bunch of Nazis, the time travelling Lady Peinforte — and the Nemesis statue, made out of a mysterious and Ace gets to kill a lot of Cybermen.

Now, on to the reviews...

Revenge of the Cybermen is problematic in that the supposedly unemotional and coldly logical Cybermen are... well... rather emotional. And suddenly, for the first time, they are afraid of gold. This story really is the beginning of the end for the Cybermen. (At least until their re-invention in the new series — although they're now on the downhill slide as well... But that's something for another review, perhaps.) Despite the fact that they can be destroyed by a handful of gold-dust and despite the Cyberleader's emotional outbursts, they are still at least fairly threatening in this story, and the cybermats are quite effective. There are some interesting characters, some good political machinations and some great interaction between the Doctor and his companions. (Everyone shout with me, "Harry Sullivan is an imbecile!") A highlight is the use of location filming in the caves at Wookey Hole. But on the whole, it's not very good and is definitely the weakest story of Tom Baker's first season.

We then skip across the years to the final classic series Cybermen story, Silver Nemesis, which also doubles as the show's 25th anniversary story. Well, at least the cyberdudes aren't as emotional in this one... but they still don't deal well with gold. Hell, this time around a single gold coin fired from a sling-shot is enough to cause death and destruction amidst a shower of sparks. Cybermen of Silver Nemesis are ineffectual, way too easy to kill and really rather unthreatening. Cybermen aside, this is an interesting (if rather confused) story, particularly in terms of the show's

mythology. If there's one thing that defines the Sylvester McCoy era for me, it's the portrayal of the In Revenge of the Cybermen a bunch of Doctor as something very much more than an His status as an archmanipulator of events is definitely taken a step or two forward in this story. The story lacks coherence and does little for the flagging reputation of the Cybermen — however, Silver Nemesis is rather fun and fairly fast-paced (just ignore the bits that don't make sense) McCoy and Aldred certainly shine as the Doctor and Ace; but, as with Revenge of the In Silver Nemesis, the Cybermen mix it up Cybermen it's the weakest story of its season.

Now, of course, it doesn't really matter if the living metal called validium. Doctor #7 gets to be stories are any good or not, because all of us diehard fans are going to buy them anyway. (Okay, okay, so I got a free review copy. But if I hadn't, I would have gone out and bought it!) What really makes releases such as this worthwhile are the extras. And there are a great bunch of extras on offer here. The commentaries are good, as are the making-of docos. What I found particularly interesting was Silver Nemesis writer, Kevin Clarke, reminiscing about how he pitched the story to JNT and his views on who the Doctor really is — God. Yes, that's right, Kevin wrote this script with the notion that the Doctor was God. The deleted and extended scenes on Silver Nemesis are a nice inclusion, helping to fill some of the holes in the transmitted version. Perhaps the most intriguing extra is a little doco called Cheques, Lies and Videotape on the Revenge disc. Using interviews with long-time fans, it tells the story of how these über-fans went about acquiring copies of the episodes in the dim, dark days prior to regular repeat screenings and the official VHS and DVD releases.

> All up, this is not a release that I would recommend to casual viewers, or even fans of the new series who are now looking to delve into the show's history. There's a good chance these stories could put them off the classic series, or at the very least, confuse them. But for those of us who know and love the original series, this box set release is worth a spot on our shelves.



By the time anyone gets to read this, all news will be old. This problem with print publications cannot be avoided; however, in an attempt to dodge dated articles I've volunteered my services to review the news as it arrives. My opinions my upset you; I am not as mild or politically correct as fence-sitter Captain Jack. No. I am the real deal. Crossovers only work when the 'other series' characters have a legitimate reason for being there (as opposed to a meaningless cameo) indeed, the alternate character ought to have more reason for being there than the cast of the hosting show.

However, the error led to Doctor Who fans calling in to complain at the factual inaccuracy.

Tennant, the tenth Doctor, played the role from 2005 until 2009. While McCoy only played the role from 1987 until 1989, he also starred in a 1996 film and given that no one else portraved the Time Lord between those two points, he takes the title as longest reigning Doctor.

A statement from Channel 4 read: "Having Wrong answer was right ... Johnny and Dee spoken to the Doctor Who production team at the lost £325,000 on TV game show Million Pound Drop BBC, the Million Pound Drop producers have confirmed that the correct answer to this question was Sylvester McCoy and not David Tennant as shown on the broadcast on Friday 5th November.

"This is due to Sylvester McCoy's final

"We apologise for this oversight and as a Husband and wife Johnny and Dee will return result, the contestants, Johnny and Dee, will return to the show to finish the game this Friday or Saturday at 10pm on Channel 4 with the £325,000 they placed on McCoy."
